With spring around the corner, well supposedly anyway, I am starting seedlings indoors to prepare for the coming planting season. This is my first year doing this and I was completely oblivious to the amount of time, care, and work that goes into making sure these little seeds have optimal conditions to germinate and pop up through the soil. Then when they do emerge from the soil you must ensure that these new little sprouts have sufficient light for enough hours during the day. You have to take great care to water them frequently enough to allow growth but not so much as to drown the plants and invite fungus. All of this happens before you can even plant them in the ground. Once they are in the ground, now is when you have to worry about weeds, insects, animals, and disease for some time before you finally begin to see fruit.



All of this process has helped me to see 1 Corinthians 3:6 in a whole new light.

I have planted, Apollos watered; but God gave the increase. (1 Corinthians 3:6)

This heavy workload can be achieved much easier when we join forces and bear the weight together. I can remember hearing as a child "Many hands make light work..." which is just another way of saying "Collaboration gets more done!" What ways are you and your church reaching out into the harvest field? Have you been looking for a way to reach your community in a relevant and effective manner? He told them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field. (Luke 10:2, NIV)

Most of my generation and most of our culture is so far removed from the farming/gardening experience that this analogy doesn't quite hit home the way it did for the Agricultural minded Jews of the first century. Looking at the amount of labor and care that goes into getting to the harvest should wake us up as a church body and help us to realize that we need each other.
