Where Have the Fathers Gone? by Aaron Powell, Co-Director

When asked to identify the greatest threat to America, former President George W. Bush responded, "The deterioration of the family." Nowhere does this seem more evident than when we see statistics like the following:



In 2011, 11.7 million families in the US were headed by a single parent, 85.2% of which were headed by a female. (US Census Bureau)

In 2011, there were 2.3 million women with children under the age of 18 who were unemployed. Single mothers account for more than half - 1.2 million - of the total number of unemployed mothers. (US Census Bureau)

These statistics make me cringe when I think about the overwhelming task women face when trying to raise a family as both mother and father. No matter how great of a job they do, there still remains an almost irreplaceable void in the children's lives. The children may never be able to identify the hole in their lives, but it is there. Without the care and compassion of others, these children have an unfortunate likelihood of being deficient in skills needed to grow up healthy and successful. Studies have shown that children from these environments are more likely to demonstrate at-risk behaviors in many areas:

- 63% of youth suicides are from fatherless homes 5 times the average. (US Dept. Of Health/Census)
- 90% of all homeless and runaway children are from fatherless homes 32 times the average.
 (Fathersunite.org)
- 85% of all children who show behavior disorders come from fatherless homes 20 times the average. (Center for Disease Control)
- 80% of rapists with anger problems come from fatherless homes –14 times the average. (Justice & Behavior, Vol 14, p. 403-26)
- 71% of all high school dropouts come from fatherless homes 9 times the average. (National Principals Association Report)

Satan is having a field day within the American family and it is hard not to feel helpless when standing on the edge of the divide trying to build a bridge across. With the current state of our nation, it is vitally important that the Body of Christ stand in the gap for these women and children. These kids eventually grow up and start families of their own. I can say from my own experience of growing up with an absent father, they need mentors to model the love of Christ for them so that they can then model the same when they, too, become parents. We can start this process of healing by being intentional with our efforts to reach the fatherless homes within our own community.
